With all of our mainline (except one set of points in a non-passenger train location) now steel or concrete sleepers we saw a significant drop off in the track training courses during the year. This has enabled us to undertake other tasks such as replace some timber and repaint the picnic shelters. We have also undertaken fence repairs on the station, upgraded the Peterson Road station, and enclosed the back steps on the cottage. A big thanks to Greg who has undertaken most of this work.

Ryan and Aaron, assisted by others, have been working away in the workshop on overhauling the Ruston while Laurie and Bob have continued their work on overhauling the ex-railmotor trailer.

Our dedicated "Rolling stock/Mechanical" work day will continue on the last Sunday of the month during 2025. Similarly, a trackwork/civil day is the second Saturday of the month. Please come along and help with these very important parts of our society.

On the Saturday prior to the public running days (1st and 3rd Sundays of the month) we need to prepare the station and train as well as mowing grass, etc. Help is also much appreciated on these days.

Sadly during the year we lost our secretary, Ian Thompson, who passed away unexpectedly. Our condolences go out to his family and friends. We have been in ongoing contact with his executors and relatives.

New National Standard for Health Assessment of Rail Safety Workers

While the Rail Safety Act is managed by ONRSR (the rail safety regulator) the Rail Safety Worker medical standard is managed by the National Transport Commission (NTC).

The NTC has released the 2024 edition of the National Standard for Health Assessment of Rail Safety Workers. The 2024 Standard was approved by the state/territory Infrastructure and Transport Ministers on 2 October 2024 and took effect from Monday 11 November 2024.

All health assessments of rail safety workers from 11 November 2024 must be conducted in accordance with the 2024 Standard and must only be conducted by Authorised Health Professionals (AHPs) who are registered in the AHP Program.

Unfortunately, despite raising issues with ATHRA (along with other smaller heritage groups) and writing to both State and Federal Transport Ministers, while some changes were made regarding using AHPs in country areas and some other minor tweaks, we were not successful in getting our requested changes to the Standard.

In conjunction with our doctor, some other heritage groups, and Rail Advancement Queensland we are currently working through the implications, etc. It is also worth a visit to the ONRSR website to see what they do and how they communicate with the rail industry.

Track Matters

"Contexts for Heritage Engineering"

Ryan Thomas and myself were invited to attend a "Contexts for Heritage Engineering" Workshop on 28-29 November 2024 at the Commissariat Store, William Street, Brisbane. It was part of a course developed by Engineering Heritage Australia (special interest group of Engineers Australia) and University of Canberra.

The Course is to equip engineers with professional conservation, assessment of significance and report preparation skills that will allow them to protect and enhance a significant heritage site or item through their engineering practice. It is part of a wider move to promote the value of all types of heritage and the continuing role in preserving all forms of technology, technological knowledge, and constructed heritage artefacts. It also draws attention to the unbalanced recognition given to the preservation of all forms of engineering and industrial (technological) heritage within the traditional heritage sector which is largely centred on fixed buildings.

It was a good opportunity to understand the concepts of significance assessment and will help to focus our future restoration and preservation works. Understanding the terminology used in the conservation sector will assist us in making more targeted grant applications.

The following day, we hosted Neil Hogg, former National Chair of Engineering Heritage Australia and passionate advocate for the recognition of Movable

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Technology Heritage. It was good to see his appreciation of our activities and for us to gain his insights into activities to promote the importance of movable heritage across Australia.

It was also interesting to learn that the University of Canberra and Engineers Australia are conducting a survey on current and future use of fossil fuels and lubricants in operating heritage machines. Fossil fuels keep heritage machines working so they are identifying what types of fuels and lubricants are used and what might be options or alternatives if a potential phasing out of fossil fuels occurs.

Platform Fence - Woodford Station

Council's Pest Control Contractor identified and treated termites in the timber fence between the D'Aguilar and Wamuran Buildings. Whilst, it may have been possible to patch and paint the fence, further investigation revealed further decay so the fence will be replaced to provide a longer term solution.

Trackwork

Whilst the trees surrounding the site and the mainline are a quintessential part of the passenger experience, removal of the accumulated leaf mulch and sticks is a constant maintenance challenge. With the Annual Independent Track Inspection scheduled for January 2025, this mulch needs to be removed from the track so that sleepers and fasteners can be seen to be inspected.

Operations, Sales and Marketing

Passengers love our open carriages in fine weather, they are unfortunately not so good on rainy/showery days. The weather, plus lack of an enclosed all-weather carriage, had a big impact on us during 2024.

As well as the direct impact with rain on the actual day, if rain is predicted we go low on the marketing on sites such as Facebook, etc. This also means we are not pushing weddings, charters, etc., which provide much needed additional income.

During 2024 overall we are down 30% on passenger numbers comparted to 2023, with resulting loss of income. If you have any ideas to help boost our passenger numbers please let myself or one of the Board members know.

The annual Pine Rivers Model Railway show was held in December. While it is not viable for us to have a sales stand, we still get to promote our operation, etc. A big thanks to member Steve Malone who kindly provided a narrow gauge model railway, and to members Steve, Deb, Graeme, Wayne and Ian who helped operate the layout and give out brochures. Also thank you to others like Matthew and Andrew who helped out. We also gave out some membership application forms and sold some books wholesale to other stands at the show.

We continue to be critically short of operations staff on public running days. If you are interested in helping with this aspect of our railway, or know of someone who is, please let myself or one of the Board members know. Where required training will be provided.
